BLESSINGS by Fr. John Raphael Hadnagy, O.F.M. Conv.

When I was in the first grade, we had a huge blizzard which covered Washington. D.C. and all of its suburbs in over two feet of snow. The evening after the snow ended, my parents trudged through the snow to our next-door neighbor's house to watch the only color television in the neighborhood, while my siblings and I stayed home with a babysitter. My parents told the babysitter, who lived with us, to go on to bed if she wanted, since they would be late.

Meanwhile, our dog pushed her bed underneath a small opening at the base of the furnace and ignited her blankets on the pilot light. Thanks be to God, there was very little fire. There was, however, a great deal of smoke. So much so that when my parents walked in and turned on the lights, my father thought that the light bulb had burned out, as it was so dark.

My mom and dad took one breath and

went into rescue mode. They first checked on our babysitter and us; then my dad went to look for the source of the fire. He found a few flames on the beams in the utility room, and our poor dog was petrified (but unharmed). My father scooped up the dog's bed in a snow shovel and threw it outside, doused the smoldering beams, and the fire was out. The fire company was unable to come due to the depth of the snow.

About ten years later, my dad mentioned to me that when our house was built, a bird had built her nest in the eaves of the garage. He said that in the Slovak tradition (our family is part Slovak), a bird's nest built in or on a part of your house is good luck. As a typical teenager, I said, "Good luck! We have had two fires in this house. How can that be good luck?" (Our renters had had another similar fire.) My father replied, "Well, nobody was killed or even hurt in either of the fires. The house was not damaged at all in either fire. I think that was

pretty good luck."

The point of this story is that true blessings come in many different forms. Many times, they even seem to be disguised as something else until we receive a certain grace, which enables us to unravel the mystery of the blessing right in front of us. So many times, blessings are a matter of perspective and trust. God blesses us and then waits for us to trust Him enough to recognize His gift. Whether that blessing is physical, spiritual, mental or emotional, it does not claim its full place in our lives until we recognize it for what it truly is and give thanks to God for it.

This year, at the Basilica and National Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation, we are focusing on the many blessings God gives to us every day of our lives. It is my great hope that each of us will open our hearts to God's grace, to realize that His blessings each day of our lives are manifold, and to be able to give thanks to Him for these wonderful gifts.

In my article later in this issue, I recount how the Friars and staff here at the Basilica and National Shrine are often blessed by our pilgrims sharing their stories of how Our Lady of Consolation has helped them through her great intercession. FATHER JUDE L. WINKLER TO PREACH DURING OUR 2010 ASSUMPTION NOVENA

The Basilica and National Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation is very happy to announce the plans for this year's Pilgrimage Season.

The Preacher for the Solemn Novena before the Solemnity of the Assumption of Our Lady (August 6 – 14) will be **Father Jude Winkler,** Conventual Franciscan from the Province of Saint Anthony in the United States.

Father entered the Franciscan Order in 1971 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1981. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree at St. Hyacinth College and Seminary in Granby,

Massachusetts; a Baccalaureate in Theology from the faculty of St. Bonaventure in Rome, Italy; and a Licentiate in Exegesis from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. He has taught, and currently teaches, courses in Sacred Scripture at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels, and has been a regular and adjunct faculty member at various schools of theology

in the United States, Romania, and England.

Father Jude has written over 300 articles on various scriptural themes for magazines in the

U.S.A., Italy, and England, as well as for "The Word Among Us" and the "Catholic Truth Society." He has written various books on scripture study for adults, including an annual lector's handbook on the Sunday readings, and has also written over 40 children's books, including an "Illustrated Children's Bible." He has three new books coming out this year.

Father Jude travels throughout Canada, England, Ghana, Ireland,

Jamaica and the United States giving parish missions, parish retreats, workshops, days of recollection, and adult education courses for laity, seminarians, priests, deacons, and religious communities.

He currently resides at St. Joseph of Cupertino Friary in Ellicott City, Maryland.


